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POPE SHENOUDA MUSEUM

August 15, 2012 marked the opening of the Pope Shenouda III Museum in the Coptic Culture Centre, Coptic Patriarchate, Cairo. The theme of the exhibit is titled "So as not to forget." The Museum showcases the 140 books published about Pope Shenouda during his lifetime after his passing; photographs of His Holiness at special events such as ordaining monks and nuns and visiting the 4th century archaeological site of Saint Menas (Maryutt) among other artefacts. Handwritten notes, letters and greeting cards by the Pope form an

interesting historical collection reflecting his papacy. On display are also gifts that were offered to His Holiness, such as a wooden cross he received from the Ethiopian Orthodox Church on one of his visits to Ethiopia and a 12th century Armenian manuscript of the Holy Bible offered to him on the occasion of his 40th anniversary by the Armenian Patriarch His Holiness Catholicos Aram I of the Holy See of Cilicia. Also on display are awards Pope Shenouda received, such as the 2000 UNESCO Madenjent Singh Prize for the Promotion of Tolerance and Non-Violence. One of the exhibits that evokes a lot of interest is a model of the desert cave in which Pope Shenouda lived as a hermit at Wadi al-Natrun before he became pope. The model houses several of his possessions while he lived in the cave: a kerosene cooker and lamp, his teapot, two water pitchers, a big wooden cross, a Bible, a collection of pictures of the Holy Virgin Mary and saints, and a small wooden bench with his name engraved on it: "The Monk Antonius al-Suriani".



Tenth International Coptic Studies Congress, Rome, Italy (September 17-20, 2012)

Every four years the International Association for Coptic Studies organizes a Congress gathering scholars and students of Coptic Studies. The 10th International Congress for Coptic Studies was hosted by the Sapienza University (Rome) Department of History, Culture and Religion, the Rector of Sapienza University, St. Augustine Patristic Institute and The Vatican Apostolic Library.

Three hundred participants from the following countries attended the congress: Australia, Austria, Belgium, Brazil, Canada (4), Czech, Denmark, Egypt (61), the largest), Finland, France, Germany, Hungary, Israel, Italy, Japan, Mexico, Netherland, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Qatar, Russia, Spain, Switzerland, Abu Dhabi, United Kingdom, and the USA.

Two hundred and thirty-two papers were presented at eleven plenary and five parallel

sessions (three times daily) throughout the week. This congress marked not only a significant increase in number of papers but more importantly the expansion of the range of Coptic Studies disciplines and areas of study. For example, Coptic Literature, Egyptian Monasticism, Coptic Bible, Coptic Art; Shenoutean Studies; Coptic Archaeology: Gnosticism and Manichaeism: Documentary Papyrology; Coptic Linguistics; Coptic Codiology and Paleography; Coptic Liturgy; Aspects of Islamic Egypt; History and Histiography; Hagiography. For the first time a full day was devoted "Coptic Religious Life in Contemporary Egypt: Recent Scholarly Developments" as compared to one paper at the 2004 Congress on the Marguerite Nakhla's paintings at St. Mark's Coptic Museum.

Traditionally plenary reports are devoted to an analysis of publications/research in the preceding four years — in this case since the last congress which was held in Cairo in 2008. Similarly to previous congresses a full bibliographic list of publications is available to all members and participants. Print copies of these reports/bibliographies are now available at St Mark's Coptic Museum's Cecile Barsoum Reference Library. A copy of the Congress programme and abstracts is also available in the Museum's Reference Library. The Eleventh Congress for Coptic Studies will be hosted by Claremont College Department of Religious Studies and the St. Shenouda the Archimandrite Coptic Society in Los Angeles, California. It will likely be held in June or July 2016.
